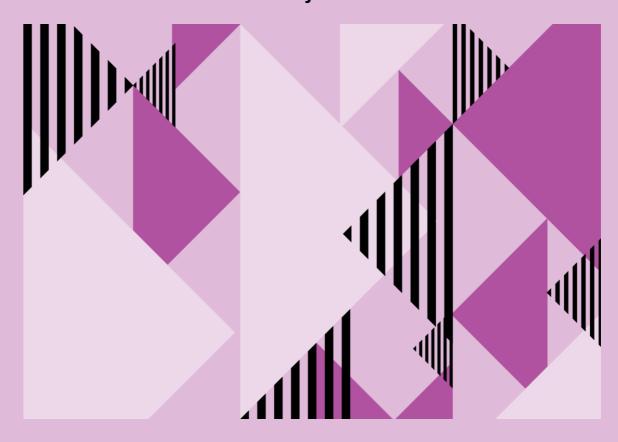

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Introduction

In July 2025, NatCen conducted a survey amongst its Opinion Panel members, as part of its Society Watch series, to collect data on social and political attitudes towards various topics amongst the UK population.

This document provides technical information related to the survey and associated dataset, including details on the data included, questionnaire wording, sample design, fieldwork approach, and the weighting methodology.

1. Sampling

The NatCen Opinion Panel is based on a random probability design, with panel members originally selected at random and considerable effort put in to maximise participation to minimise the risk of bias.

1.1 Opinion Panel recruitment surveys

Members of the NatCen Opinion Panel have been recruited through four different surveys.

In Great Britain, panel members were recruited from the British Social Attitudes (BSA) and Scottish Social Attitudes (SSA) surveys which interview people aged 16 and over¹ across Britain. The BSA and SSA are high-quality, random probability surveys where addresses are selected at random, and significant effort is expended to secure interviews. From 2015 to 2019, fieldwork was conducted face-to-face, with individuals selected at random. However, starting in 2020, in response to the COVID-19 pandemic, these surveys have employed a 'push-to-web' methodology, inviting up to two adults per household to participate online, with an opt-in telephone option also available².

In Northern Ireland, panel members were recruited from the 2021 Consumer Protection Study (CPS) and the 2023 Life in Northern Ireland (LNI) surveys which interviewed people aged 18 and over in Northern Ireland. Both surveys used a random probability survey conducted using a 'push-to-web' methodology, allowing up to two participants per household to take part online, with an opt-in telephone option also available. Since 2024, the British Social Attitudes (BSA) survey has also expanded to include people living in Northern Ireland.

Participants interviewed as part of the BSA, SSA, CPS and LNI were invited to join the Panel at the conclusion of their interview.

¹ The SSA has consistently interviewed young adults aged 16-17, whereas the BSA began interviewing them in 2024. From the Panel's inception in 2015 until December 2024, only adults aged 18 and over were eligible to join the Panel. Starting in 2025, the age threshold for Panel members was lowered to 16 years old.

1.2 Sampling for this survey

For this survey, all panel members recruited from BSA 2015 onwards and LNI, who had not subsequently left the panel or become 'inactive', were eligible to be invited. From this pool, a random sub-sample of 3,636 cases was selected, maintaining the probability-based design. Selection probabilities were adjusted by sampling in proportion to weights reflecting the extent to which panel members characteristics (age, sex, region, household structure, income, education, economic activity, ethnicity, tenure, social class, interest in politics and party support) were over- or under- represented in the eligible panel. The procedure enhances the representativeness of the issued sample as much as possible. Separate samples were taken from BSA and LNI, with each stratified by the variables used in weighting (see chapter 3).

2. Fieldwork design and response rates

2.1 Fieldwork design

Mode

Fieldwork followed a sequential mixed-mode design. Panel members were initially invited to participate in the research online, and sent multiple reminders by post, email and/or text message. If they had not completed the interview within two weeks, and if telephone numbers were available, they were then contacted by NatCen's Telephone Unit (TU) to encourage online completion or offer an interview over the phone. This approach allows us to include individuals who were unable or unwilling to complete the survey online.

Communication strategy

Issued panellists are contacted at multiple times, and via multiple modes to provide them with the required information and encourage them to take part in the live survey. Multiple modes of contact (letter, email and SMS), diverse messages (social impact, reward upon completion, urgency etc.) and different days of the week are used in order to maximise the chances of reaching different groups. These are spread across the first two weeks of fieldwork to maximise the number of people completing the questionnaire online before the outstanding sample is issued to the NatCen Telephone Unit for contact. A final set of reminders are sent three weeks into fieldwork to those that have not completed the questionnaire and for whom we do not have a contact phone number, as these panellists will not be contacted by the Telephone Unit during the last few weeks of fieldwork.

Fieldwork period

The fieldwork period lasted for one month. Web fieldwork ran from 26th June 2025 to 27th July 2025 and telephone fieldwork ran from 10th July 2025 to 27th July 2025 – a selection of participants identified as likely to take part by phone were contacted as part of early telephone fieldwork starting 3rd July 2025. Although most participants completed within the first week, the one-month approach ensured that everybody had the opportunity to take part, and not only those that are 'readily' available.

Incentive

Participants received a £5 or £10 Love2Shop voucher (either digital or physical) as a thank you for their time.

Targeted approach

To improve sample quality, fieldwork resources were redirected from individuals who are typically over-represented in the sample and participate regularly, towards those who are under-represented and participate less frequently. For instance, under-represented individuals were eligible for a higher incentive, received more reminders, and/or were contacted more frequently by our interviewers (up to eight calls).

2.2 Response rates

Response rates are a simple indicator of quality for probability-based surveys and are provided in the below table for different parts of the sample. This survey achieved a 57% overall response rate among those panellists invited to participate³.

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³ This response rate does not account for non-response as a result of people not taking part in the recruitment survey, not joining the panel, or attrition from the panel. However, since much of this bias is mitigated through our weighted sampling approach, we believe that this response rate is a better indication of the risk of bias

3. Weighting

Non-response to NatCen Opinion Panel surveys can occur at various points: the recruitment survey, the invitation to join the panel (at the end of the recruitment interview), subsequent attrition from the Panel, and the survey of panel members itself. The recruitment surveys are already weighted to adjust for non-response. Further weights are computed to adjust for non-response at the subsequent stages. The final survey weight is the product of these weights. This multi-stage approach is ideal because the correlates of non-response can be different at each stage.

3.1 Non-response

The final delivered weight is the product of the recruitment survey weight, the sample selection weight, and the panel non-response weight.

- Recruitment survey weight: The weights from the recruitment surveys followed similar designs: selection weights to adjust for uneven selection probabilities; non-response weights computed via logistic regression models of response (at address level) to adjust for differential non-response; and calibration to population estimates⁴.
- 2. **Sampling weight:** This weight adjusts for selection probabilities used in the sampling process and all non-response/attrition that occurs after the recruitment surveys but prior to sampling.

First, a logistic regression model was created to derive non-response weights to adjust for non-response that occurred prior to sampling i.e. at the panel recruitment stage plus any subsequent attrition. The following variables were used as predictors in the model: age and sex groups, region, household type, household income, education level, ethnicity, tenure, social class group, economic activity, political party identification, and interest in politics. The non-response weight was the inverse of the probability of joining/remaining in the panel.

As described above, a random subsample of panel members was selected for this survey, with boosts applied for some populations. Weights were used to adjust the probabilities of selection, therefore a "sample selection" weight was computed to account for these differential selection probabilities (equal to the inverse of the probability of being selected for the sample). The final "sampling weight" is the product of the recruitment survey weight, the panel non-response weight and the sample selection weight.

3. Survey weight: This weight is used to adjust for non-response to this panel survey.

A logistic regression model was used to estimate the probability of response for each panellist issued to the survey. The panel survey weight was equal to the inverse of the probabilities of response. This weight adjusts for non-response using the same variables as used for the panel recruitment weight above i.e. age and sex groups, region, household type etc.

Two different models were used for the BSA respondents, one for BSA15-19 (the BSA face-to-face surveys) and one for BSA20 onwards (the BSA push-to-web surveys). Another model was used for LNI respondents with predictors equivalent to those used in the BSA models. In each case, the resulting survey weight was multiplied by the sampling weight to create the final set of weights. The weights for LNI and BSA respondents were scaled before they were combined so that the proportion of respondents from NI and GB respectively is in line with the UK population.

A unimodal questionnaire design approach was adopted for the development of the survey instrument. This means that differences between the web and telephone survey have been actively minimised. Differences between the two modes, when unavoidable, are marked in the questionnaire specification presented below.
